

Equine News: September 2023

Last Wednesday saw the delivery of the second in a series of talks for our Laminitis Prevention Club members, a field walk with agronomist Hannah Shirt.

We observed the difference in physical appearance and the soil sample results from two adjacent pastures one restricted grazing paddock that was dropping picked daily and a larger paddock. We learnt the science behind why we see changes

in the grass in areas where droppings and urine have been and why it becomes less palatable. We learnt the importance of prompt dropping removal in the battle against laminitis to prevent nutrient return to the pasture in particular potassium, a key player in the transportation of nutrients to the plant. We could observe this difference in soil analysis between the two pastures with the restricted paddock having much lower soil potassium due to regular dropping collection. Hannah explained the soil analysis element by element and how the pH or acidity of the soil can affect their availability and how some of these elements can affect the soil structure. We learnt that almost all soil is sodium deficient and the importance of salt supplementation in the form of rock salt licks in the pasture.



The take home message was that soil and forage analysis can be beneficial tools in the management of laminitis but the complex interactions between the elements means knowledgeable interpretation of the results is key and it must be remembered that each horse is an individual in the way they process nutrients.

We would like thank everyone who attended the evening and a special thanks to Claire North-Lewis for allowing us to host the talk at her farm, and of course to Hannah for sharing her knowledge with us all!

The next club talk is Tuesday 19th September 7pm at the Hexham surgery.

Liz Mitchell will discuss "Insulin testing as a tool in laminitis prevention, the story so far." This will be an interactive discussion as before with lots of opportunities to ask questions and discuss personal experiences with the group and of course drinks and cakes!

Dental clinic dental plus diastema flush and sedation £95 inc VAT

Dental clinic diastema flush only inc sedation £35 in VAT
